OUR MISSION:

To promote the development of citizens' initiatives aimed at strengthening civil society in Ukraine through the creative development and implementation of charity programs and support of civic organizations, local governments and grassroots initiatives.

The CCC Creative Center was originated in 1993, when the U.S.- based Counterpart International, Inc. began implementing its program in Ukraine. The program goal was to support the emergence and development of non-government sector in Ukraine. As a result of the program implementation, a group of trainers was organized to work with civil society organizations in Ukraine, Moldova and Belarus.

Step by step, from one training session to another, the activists from Ukrainian non-governmental organizations were becoming professional trainers by learning from the experience of American fellow trainers how to develop and implement training programs and how to provide expert support and advice to the non-government organizations in Ukraine. This group of trainers had a great success in combining international experience and the knowledge of how the "third sector" operates in Ukraine. Our training allowed the non-government organizations to acquire the knowledge and skills and also develop the capacity necessary to manage their programs professionally and effectively in accordance with best international standards, and to adapt best international practices to local requirements.

It made perfect sense for this group of trainers to follow up with the creation of a free standing Ukrainian non-governmental organization, which on March 28, 1996 was officially registered as

the Charitable Foundation Creative Center Counterpart, and in April 2007 received a new name of the CCC Creative Center.

Throughout its existence, the CCC Creative Center has been focusing its efforts primarily on promoting the development of the non-governmental sector in Ukraine. The issues of institutional capacity development, improving professional skills of activists including the ability to professionally develop and implement projects have been the main staples in the CCC Creative Center's work with civil society organizations.

Gradually, CCC expanded the range of its target audiences. Starting with the project "Promoting the initiative and empowerment of local communities in line with the Law 'On Local Self-Government" (Toloka Project), CCC has been actively engaging local communities in various community development projects. The top priority area of focus there has been the promotion of partnership relations that enable local governments, various self-organized citizens' groups and other public organizations identify opportunities to work together in addressing socially significant problems. These local level partnerships have become especially important at the time of the government decentralization reform, when local communities receive the authority to independently govern themselves.











2012 – 2017 was a busy and eventful period for CCC. The Center focused its activities on four strategic areas:

- Supporting the development of civil society organizations in Ukraine;
- Promoting community development;
- Promoting philanthropy in Ukraine;
- Developing Europe-wide partnerships among civil society organizations

In 2012 - 2017, CCC:



- Conducted 86 training events attended by 1720 participants from all over Ukraine, as well as Georgia, Armenia and Moldova. The training topics included strategic planning and management, leadership, PR and communication, project proposal writing, preparation of annual reports, corruption prevention, etc.
- Conducted three schools for trainers and three schools for monitoring and evaluation, as well as a school of judicial journalism.
- Organized a press tour of courts in Cherkasy Region
- Completed 35 studies and evaluations of the status and the development of CSOs, courts, government bodies, local communities, etc.
- Administered 7 grant programs.
- Provided project grants to 49 CSOs, totaling \$201,755, and to 604 entrepreneurs, for a total of \$3,250,000.
- Completed 38 partner projects addressing the areas of the Center's focus.
- Organized 5 conferences and round tables.
- Organized 9 competitions for the best annual report by a CSO and the best business project by an internally displaced person(s).
- Put out 27 publications and created 8 online resources.
- CCC employees and members:
 - made presentations at and attended more than 130 conferences in Ukraine, as well as in the USA, Austria, Belgium, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Lithuania, Moldova, Germany, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Hungary, Croatia, Czech Republic;
 - · received training in more than 6 countries;
 - collaborated as experts with organizations such as the OSCE, the Council of Europe, UNDP and other UN agencies, the European Commission, USAID, the Peace Corps of the United States, etc

CCC ACTIVITIES IN FACTS AND FIGURES

- The CCC team together with its partners implemented 5 projects in the following areas: development of civil society organizations (2), community development (3).
- 30 training events were conducted as part of the Sustainable Urban Development project, which enabled 87 representatives of local authorities, civil society organizations from Ukraine and Georgia improve their knowledge and skills pertaining to project management, strategic planning, research and study, and public education campaign planning.
- The organization that implemented the United States Agency for International Development's Fair Justice project commissioned a team of CCC trainers to train the trainers from the National School of Judges of Ukraine on teaching methods used in adult education.

- As part of A New Breath of Culture project, 27 men and women representing local civil society organizations and museums from across Odesa Region, Mykolaiv Region, Kherson Region and Crimea improved their knowledge and skills in project management, effective communication and partnership building.
- 16 local civil society organizations from Ukraine and Georgia received a total of 105,701 EURO in grant funding in conjunction with the Sustainable Urban Development project. The grantees implemented mini-projects in engaging community residents in the community development strategic planning activities. These projects amplified the voice of young people, women, vulnerable population groups, and the groups of local citizen activists in determining development strategies for their territorial communities.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

- The Center started the Monitoring and Evaluation School program.
- The Center launched A New Breath of Culture: A Legacy Filled with the Life of Art project in partnership with Totem, the Kherson Center for Youth Initiatives, the DRONI Association (Georgia), and the Armenian Young Women Association AYWA.
- The Center completed an assessment of a survey program implementation in which court visitors were polled using the civil society report cards. The

- assessment was commissioned by the United States Agency for International Development's Fair Justice project.
- The Center organized the Second National Contest of Civil Society Organizations' Annual Reports.
- V. Kupriy, Executive Director of CCC, became Chair
 of the Public Council under the National Agency of
 Ukraine for Civil Service and also became a member
 of the Coordination Council on Civil Society under the
 President of Ukraine.

SUCCESS STORY

The Sustainable Urban Development project amplified the voice and increased participation of young residents of small cities.

The youth from the four local communities, namely the city of Horodok (Khmelnytsky Region), Bobrynets (Kirovohrad Region), and Olevsk (Zhytomyr Region) became fullfledged and influential members of the urban development strategic planning team. Specifically, thanks to the grants provided, the local civil society organizations ensured that young residents were fully engaged in determining the priorities and a vision for their cities' future development. The school students from the city of Horodok made a significant contribution to determining the vision for their city development when four of their proposals had been incorporated in the city strategic development plan. The youth of Bobrynets came up with an initiative to develop recreational areas in a city park. The young volunteers implemented the initiative with the support of the city council. The school students from the city of Korsun-Shevchenkivskyi proposed 4 social service projects which had become part of the city strategic development plan.

The Association of Small Cities of Ukraine has been the CCC Creative Center's partner for over 9 years. The partners implemented a large-scale Sustainable Development of Small Cities project supported by the European Union. The well-established teamwork ensured success of another joint project titled "Access to public information in small cities." CCC is a public organization with high performance standards that provides clients with practical solutions.

- The CCC team together with its partners implemented 4 projects in the following areas:
 - Development of civil society organizations (1)
 - · Community development (3).
- 18 local civil society organizations received a total of \$196,355.59 in grant funding as part of the Civil Society Institutions Support project to address the issues of:
 - Public participation in proposing and approving decisions by local government.
 - Development of public initiatives that address local problems using democratic mechanisms of local governance.
 - Public monitoring or public audit of the actions of executive bodies, local self-governance;
 Implementation of e-government programs at the local level.
 - Ensuring transparency of the budget process.
 - Establishing a dialog between the government and the public in implementing local policies.

- Promoting accountability and transparency of government activities.
- Promoting the implementation of the Open Government initiative along with due public monitoring.
- Promoting legislation on full access to public information.
- 20 training events were conducted in conjunction with the project on ensuring access to public information in small cities in Ukraine. The training was focused on the application of the Law on Public Information Access. As a result, 175 local government officials from 20 small cities improved their knowledge and skills essential for ensuring access to public information controlled by local councils and their executive offices.
- 2 training sessions were organized as part of the Library Leadership Development Program for Young Librarians. 28 young library specialists received training in Web 2.0 modern library technologies and in public needs evaluation and community engagement.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

- The CCC and Pioneer HI-Bred Foundation partnership effort resulted in upgrading the capacities of a rural outpatient clinic located in Stasi Village of Poltava Region.
- The Center organized the 3rd National Contest of CSOs Annual Reports.
- The Center introduced LEADERSHIP IN LAW, a training program designed for young lawyers, defense attorneys, heads of law firms, and law students. The program was offered in partnership with Student Republic, an All-Ukrainian Youth Public Organization, the Chelentano pizzeria, the Youth Forum of the Bar

Association of Ukraine, the League of Students of the Ukrainian Bar Association.

- DCCC publicly condemned the acts of violence committed by Ukrainian government against the peaceful assembly of citizens in Kiev on the night of November 29 to 30 on Independence Square and announced the cessation of any cooperation and interaction with the government authorities.
- The Center implemented the studies titled "Evaluation of the social and economic contribution of the charitable organizations of Ukraine to the Ukrainian economy" and "Funding models that

- The Center assessed the institutional development needs of and provided advice regarding the necessary organizational development activities to 18 CSOs in conjunction with the Support for Civil Society Institutions project. CCC conducted 1 training activity and 2 master class sessions that addressed organizational development issues for 20 individuals representing 15 CSOs that received UNDP grants.
- 4 training sessions were organized as part of the Young Librarians Leadership program. 28 young library specialists received training in Web 2.0 modern library technologies, in public needs evaluation and community engagement, and in the delivery of present-day library services. The Center organized the visit of 30 young librarians to Latvia The Center organized a study tour of 30 young librarians to Latvia to learn the experience of managing public libraries.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

- CCC partnered with the Pioneer HI-Bred Foundation to perform initial social development needs assessment the territorial community that resides in Stasi Village of Poltava Region.
- The Center conducted the 3rd National Contest of CSOs Annual Reports.
- CCC built close cooperation with the Bibliofest Program, which resulted in the implementation of a number of training programs, namely: the
- "Leadership" Program for Young Librarians, Train the Trainers from Among the Librarians, "Library Based Job Seeking Assistance Classes."
- CCC becomes a member of the "Reanimation Reform Package" coalition.
- Another study was conducted on the status and changes in the civil society development in Ukraine, spanning the period of 2002-2013.

The Library Leadership Development Program for Young Librarians helps libraries attract customers

Natalia Tkachiova, a young librarian from Kherson city took part in a training program and the study tour to Latvia. Following her intention to translate the new knowledge and experience into practice, Natalia realized small-scale projects, which resulted in the creation of a discussion club "Kherson Kino (Kherson Movie)" and a creative workshop "Youth Video Laboratory" in Branch Library No. 3 of the Central library system of Kherson City. Today the library schedule features regular events such as the night of documentary film, interactive discussion sessions of topical issues, master classes and skill building sessions that focus on directing, cinematography and acting, script writing and video editing for young. This way the residents of Kherson obtained not only a book depository, but an attractive place for meetings, socializing, and the exchange of ideas.

I learned about the Creative Center CCC in the fall of 2013. At that time, they announced a competition-based selection of young librarians into their "Leadership" program. I applied and found myself among the 30 selected program participants. The program included several training modules that were taught in Ukraine, an internship in Latvia offered to participants on a competitive basis, and an individual library innovation plan making period that followed the completion of the internship. The trainees came from different regions of Ukraine that for me were associated with particular parts of the map of Ukraine. In fact, this was my first experience of participating in an educational project of such a large scale. Owing to this experience, I met many of my colleagues from other areas of Ukraine, the majority of which I had never visited. And now, several years after the training, at times I find it professionally useful to be a member of the network that was formed then. Only half of the program participants managed to win the opportunity to receive training in Latvia – every second person failed to qualify in an additional contest. The idea of the trip was to show us the experience of another country, which we could use in our libraries, after completing the internship and returning to Ukraine. However, apart from the library operations, we saw the cities, met their residents and learned what the life was about in this country, among other things. It is extremely inspiring and really broadens your horizons. You come back home not only thinking how you can expand and modify the activities of an individual library branch, but you want to do more overall. At that time I was a librarian in the young readers department of one of the 34 libraries of the Kherson city library system. Now I am part of the local government as a head of the city youth department. The CCC Creative Center's project provided an impetus that changed my life, and I consider this organization as a good potential partner for joint projects.



CCC ACTIVITIES IN FACTS AND FIGURES

- The CCC team together with its partners was implementing 11 projects in the following areas of focus:
 - · Development of civil society organizations (3).
 - · Community development (7).
- Europe-wide collaboration (1).
- As part of the UNDP business grants program, CCC ensured that 255 grants distributed to internally displaced persons in 8 regions of Ukraine and to local residents of Donetsk and Luhansk Regions were properly administered. The grants supported implementation of the business plans that created 676 additional jobs.
- The Center provided 634 consultations in support of grant recipients and organized 8 information sessions.
- 1890 respondents representing the total number of people who visited 27 courts of Odesa Region were interviewed.

- According to the results of the survey 113 recommendations were prepared on improving the performance of 27 courts of general jurisdiction and commercial and administrative courts in the Region.
- CCC conducted a survey of the training needs of courts' press secretaries in Cherkasy Region. The study helped identify general training requirement for the courts' press secretaries and also develop a training program that would improve their ability to establish effective communication between the judiciary and the public.
- The training program was instrumental in helping 13 court administrators from Cherkasy Region improve their knowledge and skills in the area of media relations.
- The Center also administered the DuPont Pioneer program of corporate social responsibility.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

- CCC became the administrator of the UNDP Business Grants Program for Internally Displaced Persons in Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, Dnipro, Kyiv, Poltava, Odesa, Luhansk Regions, the city of Kyiv and the residents of Donetsk and Luhansk Regions.
- The Hungarian Ecumenical Assistance Service, in partnership with the CCC Creative Center, launched a new project aimed at developing the capacity of Ukrainian civil society organizations to provide humanitarian aid and assistance. This initiative was supported by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade of Hungary.
- The 4th National Annual Report Contest was conducted among the participating CSOs.
- CCC together with the National Academy of Public Administration under the President of Ukraine organized the XV Annual Conference of the International Program Evaluation Network. The financial support to the conference was provided by GIZ.

- CCC and the Court of Appeal of Cherkasy Region came up with an initiative to hold a conference titled "Achieving Mutual Trust by Building Effective Communication of Courts and the Public." The conference was attended by over forty-five court administration officials, representatives of the local NGOs, public libraries of Cherkasy Region and the mass media.
- Another round of graduations took place at the CCC Train the Trainer and the Monitoring and Evaluation Schools.
- CCC partnered with other CSOs to advocate for civil service reform. The CCC's active advocacy effort and the participation of its experts' in the expert advisory council created under the National State Service, resulted in the passage of a new law of Ukraine "On Civil Service" by the Ukrainian Parliament.

CCC assists businesses with the corporate social responsibility programs

CCC is making every effort to promote the culture of charity. DuPont Pioneer has selected CCC as its charity program administrator for Stasi village (Poltava Region). Owing to the financial support of the Pioneer Hi-Bred Foundation, the Bashkirtseva gymnasium (preparatory) school in Stasi has opened modern classrooms for the English language, physics and biology study. The language study classrooms are provided with a set of textbooks and dictionaries, learning games, and a licensed English language study course on discs. The biology classroom has installed teacher software, printed and dynamic visual aids, virtual lab and a printer. DuPont Pioneer also provided the physics classroom with interactive boards, electrodynamics and electricity visualization equipment, and a set of laboratory tools. In addition, new energy-efficient windows were installed in the gymnasium school and a local preschool day care center, which will help these institutions to reduce heat losses and will generate saving in paying for heat in winter. These windows will also help maintain comfortable air temperature in classrooms throughout the year and reduce the harmful effects of ultraviolet radiation.

Social responsibility is central to the DuPont Pioneer company culture. Improving the quality of life, caring for employees and residents of local communities, ensuring cleanliness of the environment, adhering to high ethical standards and strict enforcement of laws are at the core of our operations and ensure our enduring success in all countries of the world ... CCC Creative Center, a charity organization, approached the Pioneer Hi-Bred Foundation, created in 1992 by DuPont Pioneer Ukraine to carry out its charitable mission. Following a detailed review, the Pioneer Hi-Bred Foundation funded the purchase of an ambulance. The car is certified and fully equipped with a modern electrocardiograph machine and a glucose meter, which improves the quality of medical care in the local community.

- The CCC team together with its partners was engaged in implementing 7 projects in the following areas of focus:
 - Development of civil society organizations (1).
 - · Community development (5).
 - · Europe-wide collaboration (1).
- As part of the UNDP business grants program, CCC ensured that 277 grants distributed to internally displaced persons in 8 Regions of Ukraine and to local residents of Donetsk and Luhansk Regions were properly administered. The grants supported implementation of the business plans that created 710 new jobs.
- 1800 respondents representing the total number of visitors to 25 courts of Kherson Region and the Commercial Court for Mykolaiv Region were interviewed. The results of the survey were used to develop recommendations on how to improve the performance of 25 courts of general jurisdiction and commercial and administrative courts in the Region.
- The Center developed and tested an evaluation methodology that rated the executive bodies performance based on their "interaction with the public".
- Public monitoring of Ukraine's fulfillment of its obligations under the EU-Ukraine Association Agreement in the implementation of public administration reform has been carried out.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

- Lyubov Palyvoda, CCC President, was appointed to the President of Ukraine's Coordinating Council on the Promotion of Civil Society.
- A group of experts undertook a study of the current status of civil society in Ukraine. The experts who represented Ukrainian civil society organizations, government agencies, research institutes and international organizations analyzed the results of the study and proposed their definitions of "civil society" and "civil society organizations" as well as created a classification of Ukrainian CSOs, described current trends in their organizational development, identified obstacles and proposed solutions, and articulated CSOs' further development needs.
- CCC and the Court of Appeal of Cherkasy Region organized a school of legal journalism that provided training to the journalists working in the Cherkasy mass media and sponsored a press tour to the Monastyryshche and Mankivka District Courts, as well as the Uman City Court.
- CCC partnered with other CSOs and the OSCE Project Coordinator in Ukraine to create and advocate for the National Civil Society Promotion Strategy. In February 2016, the President of Ukraine issued a decree approving the National Strategy for Promoting the Development of Civil Society in Ukraine for 2016-2020.

THE CCC-ADMINISTERED UNDP BUSINESS GRANTS PROGRAM HELPS AND INSPIRES

- Maxim Nova, an internally displaced person, received a grant and built a greenhouse facility in the city of Hirske in Luhansk Region, just a few kilometers away from the separation line. He modernized his business and built an industrial grade greenhouse, where he grows ornamental plants, coniferous trees, flowers and vegetables. He currently employs three individuals.
- Bogdan Chaban, a veteran of ATO and former resident of Donetsk used the UNDP grant to open a cafeteria named "The Reading Hut" in Mariupol, which became an example of not only a popular inexpensive food serving establishment, but also a place where people can meet, socialize, and also can come to attend a cultural event.
- Lyudmila Torba from Luhansk used the grant to start a small tailor shop that makes her own brand of women's lingerie in the city of Odesa. Her shop purchased and installed commercial grade sewing machines and thus created a number of full-time jobs.
- After moving from Makiyivka to Kharkiv Region, Vitaly Melnychuk decided to raise poultry and livestock in order to gain financial independence for his family and support them psychologically. He spoke to local livestock farmers about their experiences and learned about the livestock production technologies currently used in Ukraine, Poland and the Netherlands from the Internet. This helped him recognize good opportunities for livestock farming. He developed a business plan and applied for a grant to the UNDP. The grant money allowed him to purchase necessary equipment, set up an incubator and launch the livestock and poultry production and sales.

- In Donetsk, the well-known Sherwood language school offered a range of language courses from English to Turkish. At present, the school has relocated to the city of Dnipro and continues teaching language courses. The business recovery grant enabled the owners of the private enterprise "Sherwood School of Foreign Languages" to create a new team of teachers and set up the school in a new place.
- Moving from Luhansk to Kharkiv Region, Pavlo Makarovych Stepanov started his own business. Now, along with the other four employees, he is engaged in artisan smithery and custom makes various products from metal. This became possible thanks to a grant from UNDP. Pavlo Makarovych prepared a business plan and participated in the grant competition. Purchased necessary machine tools and other equipment for entrepreneurship on the grant funds.
- Ihor Ternovyi, an entrepreneur from Mariupol and a grantee of the small grants program, opened "The Good Bakery," a mini-bakery business. Now residents of the city's Azov district have the opportunity to buy fresh bread baked close to their homes. The grant award was used to purchase baking equipment necessary to launch the business and create additional jobs. The bakery was opened and the first sales started on December 27, 2015. The main competitive advantage is the availability of hot fresh bread baked according to a tried and true recipe.



- CCC experts supported the development and approval of 6 local social services development programs in the 6 amalgamated territorial communities of Ivano-Frankivsk, Luhansk, Kherson Regions.
- The Center conducted 14 training events that highlighted territorial community governance issues and improved management practices of the municipal government. The officials from the local executive bodies of 7 amalgamated territorial communities in Donetsk and Luhansk Regions attended the training.
- CCC consultants supported the development of strategic plans for 7 amalgamated territorial communities in Donetsk and Luhansk Regions.

KEY EVENTS OF THE YEAR

• CCC was actively involved in the development of territorial communities' capacity to ensure access to quality social services. Six united territorial communities of Ivano-Frankivsk, Luhansk and Kherson Regions took part in a project designed to enhance the local governments' capability to manage social services, as well as to improve the infrastructure that supports social service organizations that aid disadvantaged, distressed and vulnerable persons. The CCC Executive Director Volodymyr Kupriy was appointed to the position of the First Deputy Head of the National Agency of Ukraine for Civil Service.

CCC assists newly formed amalgamated territorial communities in developing their capability to provide social services

Chaplynka Amalgamated territorial community was formed in Kherson Region in 2016. The decentralization does not only give extra powers to communities but also encourages local governments to assume more responsibility. The residents of the newly created ATC expect higher quality of social services. CCC and the Council of Europe helped Chaplynka ATC create a new community-owned institution "Social Services Center" by providing it with adequate facilities and resources. At present the staff of 10 social workers is responsible for providing qualified social services to the population of 17.5 thousand people using modern information and communication technologies and equipment. The village council approved an appropriate local social services development program based on a detailed community needs assessment.

The first step in the implementation of the project "Strengthening the ATCs' social services capacity" for Chaplynka ATC located in Kherson Region was the establishment of a community-owned center "Social Services Center". The resources provided by the project sponsors have played a decisive role in the local government's decision to open the center since it required significant spending from the local budget.

Based on the results of the ATC's social services needs assessment and the social profile of the community population the ATC designed two programs - "The Development of Social Services in the ATC" and "The Village Council's Program of Social Protection of the Population." The project provided the newly created community center with a facility and the full equipment set up, as well as the supplies needed to support the functions of social workers. In January 2018, an extra social worker position was added to the staff of the Social Services Center. The results of the needs assessment were also used to expand the list of services available for the community. Thus, a mobile team of social workers was created to provide emergency counseling and support services to victims of gender-based violence: the creation of a foster family was almost complete, and the referral system involving regional physical therapy specialists that rehabilitate children with disabilities was established. Now the rehabilitation specialists can see patients on site in the ATC twice a year, outside of the regional rehabilitation center. The ATC not merely increased its capacity in providing social services to the community, but significantly improved the quality and complexity of these services.

2016); "Outcome—based Project Monitoring and Evaluation Course" (World Bank, National Academy of Public Administration under the President of Ukraine, 2015 and 2016); "Improving Access of Civil Society Organizations in Ukraine to the Delivery of Social Services" (organized by the OSCE Project Coordinator in Ukraine, 2017); Human Resources Management, Municipal Management and Community Strategic Planning (organized by the Council of Europe, 2017). These training activities were instrumental in further developing the CCC professional capacity and introducing recent strategies, approaches, and interesting know how into the organization's work.

CCC participates in the annual organizational development forums, where it shares its best practices and success stories.

CCC MEMBERS SPEAK



On February 3-4, 2014, 25 librarians from public libraries attended a train-the-trainers workshop the topic of which was "Principles of employment and effective job search." This training took place in Lviv and was part of the Bibliomist program supported by the Council for International Research and Exchanges (IREX). The purpose of the training was to provide the attendees with the opportunity to learn various interactive adult learning techniques, familiarize them with the essential points of conducting training sessions, and also teach the knowledge and skills instrumental in gaining employment and doing an effective job search. As a result, these librarians started to use their libraries for teaching job seeking strategies on their own focusing on those customers who are looking for their first job (youth), or those with employment history who are either temporarily unemployed or seek to change jobs, retired individuals searching either for a full time or part time employment. The librarians - trainers disseminated information about the successes of their library-based training efforts in the Facebook using the Employment and Library message group (https://www.facebook. com/groups/614889851898076) created by them right after the TOT workshop to keep in touch. The message group is intended for the library staff and librarians who are willing to start or already helping customer to search for work. In addition, the group members post news about any events organized by libraries in Ukraine that pertain to employment, effective job search, and opening your own business.




I remember how in January of 2012 I came to attend a training - of - trainersworkshop at the CCC Creative Center. There was a terrible snowstorm that day. However, an idea of not attending never crossed my mind, even once ... Since that day, the day I was born as a trainer, I have evolved as an expert with experience in interesting international projects and specializing in the publicsector issues. As early as 2014, I came from Donetsk to CCC to spend only one month working on a project at the CCC office, and then stayed together with my son for almost two years in the very literal sense because I had no place to live other than the office. CCC became home to me in every sense of the word. Each project for me is not only an instrument for practicing my life's values and making the world better, but also a training tool that also helps me develop as a specialist and a creative person.


